2a. Kim Coates, Save Our Manchac, Tangipahoa Parish Council (District 10)

- LA Comment 5
 - Hi, Thank you, I'm Kim Coates from Pontchartrain, I am part of a non-profit, Save our Manchac and also a new Parish councilwoman of the area. A few comments: 1. We have a lot of concerns about the new levee that's going up and about flooding with raising it. Yes, it is going to protect the south shore, but it is also going to make the lake rise and St. James is also unprotected. Ascension also has some storm surge protection. St. John will, St. James will not. And then also, we've been seeing very high levels in the Manchac areas over the last two years. I have been out on many tree restoration projects and each time we go the water is higher and higher. There were at least 5 tree planting cancelations on the Maurepas land bridge this year because of high water. So we have a sinking swamp so how is the freshwater going to help when the trees can't even grow because they are under water. As of today, out in Manchac around the North Shore there is algae in December when it is cold. Nutrient pollution is huge, the Bonnet Carré Spillway is open more than it's ever been. And we are seeing our water quality go down. DEQ, CPRA all need to get together. Because if you are going to introduce more pollution from the Mississippi River into the lake, you need more monitoring long term, more funding for this. Right now we can't even get funding to test the algae. We do not know if it is toxic. Just this past week there was blue-green algae near the camps. Lake Basin over 12 years ago was a \$5Bil asset to LA. If we lose the lakes we are not only losing the water quality, we are also losing property values. So we have wetland assimilations that are going out into our water, we have many rivers that are flowing into the lakes that are highly polluted and contaminated. And then you are going to put the Mississippi River with more nutrient pollution into the lakes. Please take all that into consideration. Thank you.

2b. Warren CoCo

- LA Comment 3
 - My name is Warren CoCo, I was born and raised here in Baton Rouge. I'm a very avid duck hunter. I spent 20 years of my life right where this project is going. I know more about this piece of land than anybody here. I had over 10,000 acres I was permitted to hunt on. It was a hunters paradise, but it all changed when the habitat changed. I'm going to give my stamp of approval on this, but there's a lot of other things I think could be done also as far as micromanaging. This swamp traditionally would dry out before the Reserve Canal was dug for drainage and the ecosystem has totally changed. I totally agree with everything that y'all are trying to do. After I left hunting I was able to purchase 1600 acres of marsh land from BP when they did the merger with Amoco and I've been hunting there since 1999. I would really like to see the swamp come back. This project is going to be a great asset, but I think there's a lot more that needs to be done. I'm really happy to be here and I thank y'all for having this.

2c. David Muth, NWF

- LA Comment 2
 - Thank you all for having us here and thank you for this momentous step, My name is David Muth and I work for the National Wildlife Federation. And I am also here representing, as Brent said, the Mississippi River Delta Restoration Coalition which includes NWF, Environmental Defense Fund, National Audubon Society, the Coalition to Restore Coastal Louisiana and Lake Pontchartrain Basin Foundation. I got to know these swamps when I was a teenager, which was about 75yrs ago. I have therefore been a witness to the very slow deterioration of the Maurepas Swamp. But I realized somewhere along the line that as I spent more time in other places in LA that even when I first got to know it, there was something deeply wrong with that beautiful massive swamp. One of the largest swamp forests in North America. I can see the difference between it and river swamps, significantly the Atchafalaya. The difference was that those swamps had a river run through them and what was missing was that movement of water. Nutrients. And oxygen through the system. So here we have this incredible river flowing past one of the largest swamps in North America and it was pretty obvious that we needed to reconnect the two. As you heard that proposal has been on the books officially since 1993. So 26 years doesn't seem like a long time. This has been a project that has been deeply important to people in LA, to the citizens that live near and around the swamp. It has been deeply important to people in agencies in LA like the EPA, US Fish and Wildlife, Wildlife and Fisheries, and all the predecessors to CPRA. And it has been deeply important to me and it is just thrilling to see that the Restore Council, the Restore Staff, and EPA as the leader of Restore right now, has really worked hard to do something innovative and creative with the funding for this to make something happen. We are very much in support. Thank you.

2d. Brent Newman, Audubon LA

- LA Comment 1
 - Good Evening members of the panel and of the public, I'm Brent Newman, I'm the Deputy Director for Audubon LA for the State office of the National Audubon Society. Tonight I would like to provide a few comments in support of the River Reintroduction into the Maurepas Swamp project. First I'm going to express my support to the comments to be provided by David Muth on behalf of Restore Mississippi Delta Coalition which Audubon is a partner. And then I just want to comment briefly from Audubon LA's perspective on the benefits of this project. Restoring the Mississippi River Delta is an important key element to the National Audubon coast strategy. This project will help birds on the gulf coast recover from not just recent disasters like the BP Oil spill and hurricanes, but from other stressors like coastal erosion and development. Because of the fines paid by BP and other responsible parties, Council and the residents of the Gulf, have the opportunity to restore bird population and the places they need. While achieving multiple other benefits for the environment, the economy, and protecting the sportsman's paradise that we all call home. The Maurepas River Reintroduction project will support and provide enhanced habitat for many species that rely on the Gulf Ecosystem. From resident marsh birds like Wood Ducks, to migratory species such as the American White Pelicans, prothonotary warblers, and Bald Eagles. Restoring these habitats provide many benefits including improved water quality and increased resilience against storms and coastal erosion. Providing critical buffer areas for our wildlife and coastal communities. At Audubon we frequently remind ourselves and others that when birds thrive, people progress. This project is a good example for how that multipurpose goal can be achieved on the ground through good planning and implementation. So on behalf of our 1.6 million members nationally and over 13,000 here in LA, we would like to express our support for this project. Thank you for your time tonight.

2e. Sean Turner, Vanishing Paradise

If we could get this project fully in motion and get the funding that we really need, I can see such a dramatic change where people older than me, maybe even my grandkids would be able to use today.  - Hi there, this is Jessica Bibza with the National Wildlife Federation and again thank y'all for being here tonight. I just wanted to also express appreciation for the inclusion of the Perdido Land Acquisition Project. The National Wildlife Federation has identified a number of priorities across the Gulf and land acquisition within the Perdido Watershed is one of the priorities that we have highlighted. I am really excited to see not just this project, but Commissioner Blankenship a lot of the projects that AL and FL have been identifying to really expand that squad of protected ecosystems in the watershed on both sides of the stateline.

 - Well good evening everyone. Thank you for all of your hard work and having this meeting this afternoon. As I have said before in Public Comment as it relates to the BP Restore Act, my main concern is just making sure that the process is diverse and inclusive. Making sure that communities that are often underserved are actually a priority as you look to expend this money. Also as you look to do your projects, making sure that we tap into those communities for contracts and things of that nature going forward. So again, thank you for all of your hard work and I look forward to working with you.

3c. Kara Fox, National Audubon Society

- Alabama Comment 4
 - Hi Good Evening, my name is Kara Fox and I am the Director of Gulf Restoration for the National Audubon Society. Audubon is heavily supportive of the Restore Council announcement to invest \$158M to restore the Gulf Coast as part of the recovery effort nearly 10 years after the BP Oil disaster. The River Reintroduction into Maurepas Swamp project and the Perdido Land Acquisition project will not only help birds recover from the BP Oil spill but also some decades of habitat degradation. Restoring these habitats will include improving water quality, better resilience against storms, flooding, and coastal erosion, providing critical buffer areas for our wildlife, and a better coastal community. The issues facing the Gulf of Mexico, go far beyond the boundaries of any one state. We commend the Council for finding creative and collaborative solutions to produce real change in the whole Gulf region for the benefit of the birds, other wildlife, and people. Thank you.

3d. Yael Girard, Weeks Bay Foundation

- Alabama Comment 5
 - My name is Yael Girard and I am the Director of Weeks Bay Foundation. We have been an accredited land trust in AL working for conservation for the last 30 years and I wanted to express our support for the Perdido River and Land Conservation Habitat project. There were a couple of things noted in the presentation. This area is urbanizing rapidly. We are looking at a projected 60% population increase in Baldwin County between 2010-2040. The Perdido area corridor is one of the last watersheds because water traps the land that we can still protect. We talked about habitat connectivity and those large areas really provide that. We have a lot of endangered species that are in that range including our state reptile as well as the Indigo Snake, gopher tortoises that Commissioner Blankenship mentioned, and the Diamondback Terrapin. This is extremely important for those species because they are all water dependent. We don't want to lose them. As we also look down the road for future restoration, FL has been doing a great job on their side of the Perdido with the Blue Way and Camping platforms and opportunities for public access. One of the things that was mentioned in the presentation was this idea of fostering future stewards of the outdoors and the environment. By getting people outside and protecting these areas and then providing public access we know that that increases the citizens' likelihood of being good stewards of this land. We have a lot of movement on this Perdido corridor as far as conservation, we've been working for the last year and a half on 2300 acres south of this property and we are super excited to see this happening. So thank y'all so much for everything you're doing on these projects.

Support for: River Reintroduction to Maurepas Swamp

Project Benefits: Project benefits for this project are significant and urgently needed, including storm surge protection for communities and restoration of wildlife habitat.

- Storm Surge Resilience - Storm Surge Resilience - This project is expected to maintain over 45,000 acres of land over the next 50 years, including the Maurepas Landbridge, which was identified as a "critical landscape feature" by the Army Corps of Engineers because of its importance in reducing storm surge. The restored area of the Maurepas Swamp would provide an additional layer of natural flood defense in front of the Westshore Lake Pontchartrain levee, a "multiple lines of defense" strategy, providing substantial, long-term improvements in community resilience.

- Wildlife Habitat - Wildlife Habitat - Maurepas Swamp is a vibrant place still teeming with wildlife including alligators, mink, bald eagles, and one of the largest populations of nesting prothonotary warblers in the world. But compared to the Atchafalaya, it produces far less crawfish, fish and wildlife per acre. What is the difference? A river runs through the Atchafalaya. This project will allow Mississippi river water to flow through Maurepas swamp, restoring some of its lost productivity and sustaining it into the future.

Key Impact Points

- The Maurepas swamp is one of the largest forested wetlands in the nation. Without reintroduction of Mississippi River water and sediment, one of the largest bald-cypress swamps in the nation will die and the area could convert to open water.
- The project is anticipated to benefit 45,000 acres of swamp habitat. We strongly encourage the RESTORE Council to provide construction funds to the River Reintroduction to Maurepas Swamp Project. Dear Council Members:

I am writing to express the support of The Nature Conservancy for the two projects proposed by the Gulf Coast Ecosystem Restoration (RESTORE) Council in its draft Funded Priority List 3a.

First, The Nature Conservancy welcomes and supports the inclusion of the River Reintroduction into Maurepas Swamp project on the Draft FPL 3a list.

The proposed project will help conserve critical coastal forest habitat by reintroducing Mississippi River water through a conveyance channel and directing it through the Maurepas Swamp. The project will positively impact approximately 45,000 acres of the Swamp's 140,850 acres of bald cypress/water tupelo habitat by moving sediment-laden, oxygenated water into the swamp thus countering land subsidence and hypoxic conditions and helping to sustain the swamp in times of severe drought.

A healthy Maurepas Swamp provides important and decreasingly available habitat for migratory birds and a rich array of wildlife. It also provides ecosystem services to the communities in and around the Swamp including protecting the new levees to be constructed in association with the proposed project, providing access to the public for hunting and fishing, and serving as a research site related to sustaining Louisiana's coastal ecosystem.

The proposed Maurepas Swamp project is an example of using nature to contribute to the resiliency of a habitat that benefits area residents and wildlife resources. This project has long been recognized in Louisiana's efforts to conserve its coast as a significant restoration opportunity. We are pleased that the RESTORE Council has nominated this important project for funding.

Second, TNC also supports the inclusion in FPL 3a the proposed "Perdido River Land Conservation and Habitat Enhancements" in Alabama.

This project is an example of timely bi-state cooperation to protect the health of a rapidly developing watershed that has been identified as a specific priority for action in the Gulf Coast Ecosystem Restoration Council's Planning Framework (2019).

While there have been important previous land acquisition projects along the Perdido River in both Florida and Alabama, there is now strong development pressure in the southern part of the watershed. By acquiring additional land for conservation purposes and implementing appropriate long-term forest management on that land, the proposed project would ensure that the Perdido River corridor would remain mostly undeveloped and that the river would be a source of clean freshwater to the Perdido Bay estuary. The project will complete another piece of the proposal TNC submitted to the states of Florida and Alabama for protection of the Perdido Watershed (Perdido River Water Quality Protection, Habitat Restoration and Recreational Enhancement Project).

In addition, the project will:

Further enhance opportunities for recreation and environmental education by helping to complete the overall conservation of the Perdido river corridor which is now the site of the Perdido River Paddle Trail that is being created by the states of Alabama and Florida.

Provide additional habitat for the rich diversity of plants and animals using the watershed including resident and migratory birds, reptiles, amphibians and fish.

Serve as a foundational project for the newly formed Pensacola and Perdido Bay Estuary Program. - The Maurepas swamp is one of the largest forested wetlands in the nation. Without reintroduction of Mississippi River water and sediment, one of the largest bald-cypress swamps in the nation will die and the area could convert to open water.

The project is anticipated to benefit 45,000 acres of swamp habitat. We strongly encourage the RESTORE Council to provide construction funds to the River Reintroduction to Maurepas Swamp Project. This project would be an outstanding example of putting RESTORE dollars toward a landscape-scale initiative that can succeed in the face of rising seas.

This project has been planned and supported for decades by local, state, and Federal government as well as public stakeholders.

Project benefits are significant and urgently needed, including storm surge protection for communities from the Greater New Orleans to the Greater Baton Rouge areas and restoration of critical wildlife habitat.

- Storm Surge Resilience - This project is expected to maintain over 45,000 acres of land over the next 50 years, including the Maurepas Landbridge, which was identified as a "critical landscape feature" by the Army Corps of Engineers because of its importance in reducing storm surge. The restored area of the Maurepas Swamp would provide an additional layer of natural flood defense in front of the Westshore Lake Pontchartrain levee, a "multiple lines of defense" strategy, providing substantial, long-term improvements in community resilience.

- Wildlife Habitat – Maurepas Swamp is a vibrant place still teeming with wildlife including alligators, mink, bald eagles, and one of the largest populations of nesting prothonotary warblers in the world. Good evening and thank you Members of the Gulf Coast Ecosystem Restoration Council. My name is Cindy Brown and I am the Executive Director of the Land Trust for Louisiana, the only nationally-accredited, state-based conservation land trust actively working across the entire state of Louisiana.

The mission of The Land Trust for Louisiana is to protect the places that make up Louisiana's unique, diverse and cherished landscapes that are vital to the state's natural heritage, our prosperity, and our way of life - deep woods, native prairies, family farms, river floodplains, productive marshlands. We currently hold over 7,000 acres in conservation easements or fee title on private property in multiple parishes across the state.

In August of 2011, with the assistance of The Conservation Fund, The State of Louisiana, Entergy Corporation, National Audubon Society, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, The Land Trust for Louisiana was awarded a grant by the NAWCCA Council to acquire 669 acres in the heart of the Maurepas Swamp to be preserved in perpetuity by the Land Trust.

The property is composed of cypress/ tupelo forested wetland areas, with patches of open coastal swamp. As a result of the diverse habitat present, this tract supports numerous bird and wildlife species - 10 Priority or High Priority migratory waterfowl species, scores of Neotropical migrant including extremely dense breeding populations of Prothonotary Warbler, Northern Parula, and Yellow-throated Warbler, and 24 Priority Wetland-Associated Bird Species. This habitat, particularly the upland riparian habitat, is a wildlife corridor that helps connect subpopulations of other land animals, including the threatened Louisiana Black Bear, by facilitating genetic flow. With the help of Natural Resources Conservation Service and volunteers, we are actively involved in restoring the native flora to this area, while eradicating Chinese tallow and other invasive species.

The significance of the permanent protection of our holdings in the Maurepas Swamp is that it complements the utilization of multiple funding sources by numerous partners across the project area over the last 20 years. To kick off this multi-year, multi-million dollar effort, the Richard King Mellon Foundation acquired and donated 62,500 acres to the State of Louisiana in 2001 to create the Maurepas Swamp Wildlife Management Area. Incrementally, lands have been added to this world-class ecosystem (see attached).

In total, we - the conservation community - have protected over 140,000 acres of critical coastal Louisiana wetlands in the Maurepas Swamp.

And yet, land conservation alone is not enough to protect this landscape - a landscape critical not only to wildlife but also important for mitigating storm surge and protecting millions of Louisianians in Ascension, Livingston, East Baton Rouge and Tangipahoa parishes. As we know, without the introduction of freshwater into this system, the future of Lake Maurepas is indeed precarious. In order to protect our collective investment, it is imperative that the freshwater diversion into Maurepas, as proposed in FPL 3a, is built and effectively operated.

Thank you for your time tonight and thanks for all the work you are doing on behalf of the Gulf Coast.

 - Dear Sir/Ms: I have reviewed the Draft Funded Priorities List 3a, and I have the following comments: The proposed project, River Reintroduction into Maurepas Swamp, is a truly excellent coastal ecological restoration project. It will restore the connectivity of the Maurepas Swamp, one of the largest remaining coastal bald cypress-water tupelo swamps on the Gulf coast, with the river which created the landscape of which it is a part, and which nourished the swamp for centuries- the Mississippi River. This will, at a minimum, prolong the existence of the swamp in the precarious context of ongoing, and possibly increasing, relative sea level rise. This project has been thoroughly evaluated, developed, re-evaluated, and redesigned. There are few coastal restoration projects which have been so exhaustively studied and developed. The project has a solid basis in the peer reviewed scientific coastal ecological restoration literature. However, the proposal includes the following statement: CPRA has the opportunity to streamline this Project's Environmental Compliance by partnering with USACE to use the Maurepas Project as wetland mitigation for the swamp impacts of the federal WSLP Project, as the Maurepas Project was identified as a mitigation alternative in the WSLP EIS. With this opportunity, Environmental Compliance for the Maurepas Project would likely be documented in a supplemental Environmental Assessment (EA) to the WSLP EIS. Under no circumstances should the Restore Council entertain funding this project as mitigation for impacts attributable to the WSLP. This would be contrary to Clean Water Act Section 404 and NEPA. The WSLP project must fund its own required compensatory mitigation for unavoidable impacts to aquatic resources. It is unacceptable for the State and/or RESTORE Council to consider using Deepwater Horizon funds to pay for mitigation for wetland impacts of the WSLP project. I cannot emphasize enough how unacceptable and inappropriate this would be. I object to it in the strongest way possible. Finally, the state should give more credit to the early work done on this project under CWPPRA. The proposal is very disingenuous in glossing over the critical early accomplishments on this project. Please note that I would like to "qualify" these comments, perhaps clarify them in light of feedback I got after sending them, and make some recommendations for improving the situation. As I mentioned, I received some feedback from some colleagues in the environmental community after sending these comments, suggesting that I don't understand the proposal to allow the Maurepas restoration project to mitigate for unavoidable impacts of the proposed West Lake Pontchartrain Hurricane Protection Levee. I have decided that is indeed possible. In light of this possibility, I make the following recommendations: Do not bury the critically important proposal to allow the Maurepas restoration project to provide compensatory mitigation for unavoidable impacts of the West Lake Pontchartrain Hurricane Protection Levee, on aquatic habitats, deep within the proposal. Highlight it and place it up front in the proposal so people don't miss it.

Do not trivialize the significance of this proposal by only devoting a few sentences to it, which explain practically nothing. Describe what is proposed in detail, and try to address the obvious concerns this proposal is bound to raise.

Obtain legal reviews to ensure that what is proposed is completely legal and fully consistent with NEPA and the Clean Water Act, Section 404, and especially the Mitigation Rule, as well as whatever legal and ethical guidance exists for the RESTORE Council. Provide documentation of this with the proposal for public review.

Discuss the potential for this proposal to set an undesirable precedent that some may be anxious to use to their advantage in the future. Why shouldn't we be concerned that other RESTORE Act funded projects, or other coastal restoration projects in general, may be increasingly viewed as a means to fund legally required compensatory mitigation for all kinds of projects that degrade aquatic habitats? Explain, in detail, why I should not fear this is a very slippery slope?

If these recommendations are addressed, provide the additional information to the public for additional review and comment.

I am writing to express my strong support for funding of the proposed Maurepas Swamp River Reintroduction project currently under consideration for funding under Draft FPL 3a. I am a graduate student in landscape architecture at the Robert Reich School of Landscape Architecture at Louisiana State University, one of the most admired landscape architecture programs in the country (see the Design Intelligence 2019 School Rankings). My independent research during my time at LSU has

focused on the West Lake Pontchartrain region, including the Maurepas Swamp and the proposed Maurepas River Reintroduction project.

The Maurepas Swamp is the second largest freshwater forested wetland in Louisiana, and provides valuable habitat for numerous plant and animal species with deep cultural significance to the state of Louisiana, including alligators, egrets, herons, wood ducks, and the iconic bald cypress tree. In addition, the swamp provides valuable ecosystem services for the residents of St. James and St. John the Baptist Parishes, including storm-surge protection, recreation, and carbon-dioxide sequestration. Human activity and alterations to the landscape, including extensive logging, levee and canal construction, and development, have put this fragile deltaic landscape at risk. Recent research indicates that nearly three-quarters of the swamp can be classified as either degraded or relict (see Gary Shaffer et al., "Decline of the Maurepas Swamp, Pontchartrain Basin, Louisiana, and Approaches to Restoration," *Water* 8, no. 3 (March 15, 2016): 101, <https://doi.org/10.3390/w8030101>).

The River Reintroduction project is a vital first step to ensuring the long-term health and sustainability of the Maurepas Swamp and West Lake Pontchartrain region. The project will re-create the hydrologic patterns that historically sustained the area, introducing valuable fresh water, nutrients, and sediments into the heart of the swamp. Without this project, there is a very real chance that this important ecological and cultural landscape could be lost forever.

The Maurepas River Reintroduction Project is also important for the precedent it will set as the first swamp restoration project of its kind. The research and knowledge generated by the implementation and management of this project will almost certainly help to inform future restoration projects around the nation, extending the project's benefits far beyond Maurepas Swamp.

For these reasons, I urge the RESTORE council to fund the Maurepas Swamp River Reintroduction as proposed in Draft FPL 3a.

The Gulf Coast Restoration System Council is considering funding for the Maurepas Swamp. It is important to fully support and fund the Maurepas Swamp restoration for the resilience of this magnificent ecosystem of bald-cypress and water-tupelo tree forests, which are among the largest swamp forest habitats in the world. The flora, fauna and unique creatures in the Maurepas Swamp hold this unique habitat together to keep proper vegetation, salinity levels and land mass and protects South Louisiana communities from flooding and mitigates erosion of the land. It is essential that Restore the Mississippi River Delta be able to introduce new Mississippi River water, nutrients and sediment to create and protect 45,000 acres of the Maurepas Swamp.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am in full support of the River Reintroduction into the Maurepas Swamp in Louisiana. I have fished and hunted in the Maurepas Swamp for nearly 60 years. My first memories of the swamp go back to when I was four years old and accompanied my father on fishing trips to Blind River. My father was born in Sorrento, Louisiana which is on the northwestern edge of the swamp in 1915. His family moved to Sorrento shortly before his birth to participate in the economic boom created by the cypress saw mill and logging operation in Sorrento. The swamp was originally part of the Mississippi River Flood Plain but was cut off by the Mississippi River Levees. As a result of the Maurepas Swamp being cut off from the river, it started a slow decline which has accelerated over the years. It is now in a state of rapid decline due to lack of fresh water and sediment. The water quality is poor, and increased salinity levels are having a negative impact on the cypress and tupelo trees that are starving for nutrients. The fresh water from the Mississippi River will provide nitrogen-laden water that will be absorbed by the trees and plants in the swamp.

The Maurepas River Diversion will also provide other benefits. One of these will be less nitrogen-laden water flowing into the Gulf since the nitrogen will be absorbed by the trees and plant life in the wetlands. Secondly, the diversion could be incorporated into the West Shore Lake Pontchartrain Flood Control Project that is currently being constructed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in conjunction with the Louisiana Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority. The water intake from the river is going to be near Garyville, Louisiana. This project, due to its timing, presents a unique opportunity to save money on design and construction.

In essence, this project will restore approximately 45,000 acres of degraded wetlands that will filter sediment from the Mississippi River and provide a healthy cypress swamp to serve as a barrier to future hurricanes. I would also encourage the council to consider other water diversions further up the Mississippi River for future Restore projects such as the proposed Union Diversion which could help mitigate the use of the Bonnet Carre Spillway during flood events.

no ducks or crawfish because the water is stagnant and starting to have saltwater infiltrating more every year. The wolf is knocking at our door. These great swamps are the last defense against storm surge and are depleting fast.

I have been fortunate to have made my living in the only natural diversions east of the Atchafalaya. I know first hand what diversions can do for an area. The river brings life to whatever it touches. New land and habitat are created with each passing day. The trees come to life and the animals return to the restored sanctuaries. In the diversions are 184 different bird species compared to just a handful of pelicans and seagulls just across the river where the river has been leveed from the marsh.

Maurepas swamp was once a great swamp, famous for the Mallards that were once hunted there. Crawfish and catfish as well as a great Bass fishery were great for the economy of this area. By diverting the river back into the swamp all of this will return in no time. It is unbuildable to many how fast things will turn around once the river water starts to flow. I have lived in diversions most of my life and know first hand what they can do.

I strongly encourage the Restore Council to fund this project to bring back to life one of American's greatest swamps.

The City of New Orleans strongly supports the "River Reintroduction to Maurepas Swamp - FPL3A" project, and urge the RESTORE Council to authorize full construction funding. The benefits of this project are significant and urgently needed, including storm surge protection for communities from the Greater New Orleans area and restoration of critical wildlife habitat.

The Maurepas swamp is one of the largest forested wetlands in the nation - home to the largest bald-cypress swamps - and without the reintroduction of Mississippi River water and sediment to the ecosystem, these species could die and the area would convert to open water. This project will allow Mississippi river water to be reintroduced to the Maurepas swamp, restoring some of its lost productivity and sustaining it into the future.

Additionally, this project is expected to maintain over 45,000 acres of land over the next 50 years, including the Maurepas Landbridge, which was identified as a "critical landscape feature" by the Army Corps of Engineers because of its importance in reducing storm surge. The restored area of the Maurepas Swamp would provide an additional layer of natural flood defense in front of the Westshore Lake Pontchartrain levee, the new \$1.3M MYS Airport, and I-10, which is a critical evacuation route in the event of a hurricane.

Since 1989, the Lake Pontchartrain Basin Foundation's (LPBF) mission is to drive environmental sustainability and stewardship through scientific research, education and advocacy. LPBF's policies and advocacy are founded on sound science, and for this reason, we urge the RESTORE Council to support the construction of the Mississippi River Reintroduction into Maurepas Swamp project.

The Mississippi River Reintroduction into Maurepas Swamp project is a perfect complement to other projects in river parish region, which together are a "Multiple Lines of Defense" system to reduce risk and enhance resiliency for local communities. The adjacent West Shore Levee being constructed on higher ground of the natural levee to protect the vital River Parish Corridor, along with Non-structural programming, are the key components to having an adjacent healthy flanking swamp habitat to inhibit surge attack on the levee. Louisiana needs some levees to protect key communities, but we also need our wetlands to protect our levees. This project helps do precisely that by complementary green/grey infrastructure.

We know the River Reintroduction project will enhance growth rates of the swamp because the swamp within the nearby Bonnet Carre Spillway has been shown to have significantly higher growth rates than the adjacent swamps, which do not receive any river water. We know that swamp tree species are resilient to hurricane surge because within the Pearl River watershed cypress tree nearly all survived in spite of extreme storm surge during Hurricane Katrina. We know that a wetland forest is the most effective natural habitat to buffering storm surge because of the tree's tall profile and resulting enhanced "R" factor. We know that introduced river water stimulates productivity of the estuary as seen in the iconic Atchafalaya Basin system.

None of these technical merits should be surprising to Federal agencies, who have previously endorsed this project through CWPPRA and LCA restoration programs. In addition, the state of Louisiana has selected this project in Coast 2050 and then in all three successive Coastal Master Plans, including the current plan. LPBF has included this project in their Environmental Protection Agency approved Comprehensive Habitat Management Plan and in its Pontchartrain Coastal lines of Defense priority restoration projects since 2006. The Mississippi River Delta coalition also has this as a priority project for coastal Louisiana.

The bottom-line is that the Mississippi River Reintroduction into Maurepas Swamp has been thoroughly scientifically vetted by state and Federal agencies. It has simply been on hold due to funding, which we now urge the RESTORE Council a help address. Due to the urgency of getting this project constructed and operating, we request you fulfill Louisiana's Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority's request to provide the full \$130 million of funding needed in FPL 3a.

As a supporter of the Coalition to Restore Coastal Louisiana, I am writing in support of the Funding Priority List 3a proposal for allocating \$130 million dollars to the River Reintroduction into the Maurepas Swamp project. I live in Coastal Louisiana, and I am very concerned about the changes that I have seen on the coast in my lifetime. I believe that it is critical to work as quickly as possible to restore large areas of the coast and to use the best science available to advance decision making. It is critical that we not allow politics to dictate decision-making on implementing large-scale restoration projects.

Restoration of the Maurepas Swamp is essential. The goal of this project is to convey Mississippi River water, nutrients, and sediment to rebuild swamp habitat. The project is anticipated to benefit about 45,000 acres of swamp habitat at a total cost of \$190 million, with \$130 million requested from the RESTORE council.

Redirecting river water here will not only rebuild dying swamps but will also help re-establish a healthy ecosystem that once existed. Maurepas Swamp is a vibrant place still teeming with wildlife including alligators, mink, bald eagles, and one of the largest populations of nesting prothonotary warblers in the world. If this project is not completed, the area will complete its conversion into open water, which would devastate the wildlife habitat and expose nearby communities to increased risk from storm events.

This project has been featured in numerous restoration plans dating back to the 1998 “Coast 2050” plan. It has been identified as important for multiple reasons, including its potential to reduce storm surge in communities surrounding the swamp. These communities are some of the fastest growing in the state, and there is currently no major structural storm protection in the area. This project is currently designed to be built directly adjacent to the Army Corps of Engineers West Shore Lake Pontchartrain Levee project (WSLP). The first 1.5 miles of the eastern guide levee of the Maurepas project will be integrated with the WSLP. Providing these funds as quickly as possible to the State of Louisiana will allow both projects to proceed quicker and cheaper by providing opportunities for the agencies to consolidate the final design and construction of both projects.

CRCL has been a passionate supporter of restoration in this area for the past decade. We have engaged 526 volunteers, planted 8,400 trees and enhanced just under 60 acres in the area. The undersigned groups appreciate the opportunity to share our supporting comments on the Mississippi River Reintroduction into Maurepas Swamp Project, submitted by the State of Louisiana for RESTORE Council consideration for the Funded Priorities List 3a of the RESTORE Pot 2 Council-selected projects.

We represent a coalition of conservation interests that have worked for decades to restore a healthy Gulf of Mexico ecosystem—starting with prompt restoration of the Mississippi River Delta—reconnecting the Mississippi River to its delta to protect communities, environment, and economies. Our groups continue to recommend urgent action on projects that will reduce land loss and restore wetlands in the Mississippi River Delta through comprehensive restoration actions that have the potential to provide multiple benefits and services over the long term to the entire Gulf of Mexico.

The Mississippi River Reintroduction into Maurepas Swamp has long been discussed as an important coastal restoration project: it was featured as a key restoration project in the 1998 "Coast 2050" plan, was further developed in the Coastal Wetlands Planning Protection and Restoration Act (CWPPRA) program with EPA as its sponsor, was included in the Louisiana Coastal Area (LCA) Study (WRDA 2007) and the previous three Louisiana Coastal Master Plans (2007, 2012 and 2017). We believe that this project is aligned with RESTORE Council goals and objectives, and the state's proposal clearly articulates how the project meets three of the four priority criteria. As the external science reviewers said "the project has clearly defined goals and objectives, measures of success aligning with the primary project goals are identified, and the methods for the proposed project are clearly defined with appropriate justification." We commend the state for submitting such a strong and thorough proposal.

This diversion, planned near Angelina, will provide sediment and fresh, oxygenated water to existing wetlands in East Maurepas swamp. Dominated by bald cypress and water tupelo trees, the Maurepas swamp complex is one of the largest forested wetlands in the nation. However, levees constructed along the river have isolated the area from spring floods and the vital fresh water, nutrients and sediment they bring. This isolation, coupled with rising salinities throughout the Pontchartrain Basin while the MRGO was open, has left the swamp in a state of rapid decline - trees are dying, and young trees are not growing to replace them. The River Reintroduction into Maurepas Swamp project will benefit 45,000+ acres of swamp by reconnecting it with the river, aiding the prevention of further wetland loss and the conversion of swamps to marshes, as well as helping to offset future increases in salinity throughout the western Pontchartrain Basin. The fine grain sediment may also increase elevation to a point where there are periods without inundation so that seeds can germinate, perpetuating the forest into the future.

Swamps provide many benefits, including reducing storm surge from hurricanes and flooding and stifling erosion, as well as incredible habitat for birds and other wildlife. Our swamps also help make Louisiana the "Sportsman's Paradise," providing incredible ecotourism opportunities from kayaking to birding to fishing and hunting. One study estimates that more than 2 million people visit Louisiana annually to hunt, fish or see wildlife.

Additionally, this project will complement other nearby diversions being planned, including the Union and Manchac Landbridge diversions. Together, these diversions maintain important swamp and coastal habitats that help protect many communities in the region, including Baton Rouge. These projects will help maintain the Manchac Landbridge, a narrow strip of land between Lakes Pontchartrain and Maurepas, which will prevent the two lakes from merging, a situation that would be devastating and could send storm surge to communities from the River Parishes into the Greater Baton Rouge area.

Finally, the Mississippi River Reintroduction into Maurepas Swamp project would be directly adjacent to the United States Army Corps of Engineers' West Shore Lake Pontchartrain levee project. We believe that the long term ecosystem benefits of this project would provide mitigation for bottomland hardwood and swamp habitat that is lost through the construction of the West Shore Lake Pontchartrain project. We have encouraged the Army Corps to consider using the Maurepas project as mitigation for the loss of bottomland hardwood habitat that will occur through the construction of the levee. Additionally, it is critical that RESTORE funds are provided to the State as quickly as possible for the State to take advantage of design and construction efficiencies that can be obtained by planning and designing these two projects in sync.

Due to the urgency of getting this project constructed and operating, the below signatories commend Louisiana's Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority for submitting this project for consideration in FPL 3a, and we urge the RESTORE Council to select this project and provide the full \$130 million of funding needed.

As a supporter of the Coalition to Restore Coastal Louisiana, I am writing in support of the Funding Priority List 3a proposal for allocating \$130 million dollars to the River Reintroduction into the Maurepas Swamp project, **ALONG WITH MY SUPPORT FOR INSTALLING A SIPHON FACILITY WHERE BAYOU MANCHAC MEETS THE MISS. RIVER TO BE ABLE TO REDUCE AMITE RIVER FLOODING.**

I live in Coastal Louisiana, and I am very concerned about the changes that I have seen on the coast in my lifetime.
